

What price do you pay for Freedom? - cheap and a right, or costly and a privilege? It was on June 6th this year that the D Day landings on that day in 1944 were being commemorated around the country and across Europe, including at Arley and Ansley by the Memorial at St Wilfrid's church. No doubt many of you will have read some of the stories of bravery and inspiration that were written in the national newspapers or seen on television or heard on radio. On that one day alone, casualties were over 10,000, with 4,414 confirmed dead. This year there was even a song which was to surpass Ed Sheeran on the Amazon best sellers list, written by an ex-serviceman, Jim Radford now 90 years old. He was a galley boy aged 15 at the time and regarded as the youngest surviving person on D Day. On board a deep-sea tug, he helped to construct artificial harbours in northern France. As he approached the shores of Normandy he described it as, 'being like a war film but you can't switch it off'. He also said, 'The best way we can honour those who fell is, to make sure it doesn't happen again'. The last two lines of his song called 'The Shores of Normandy' are: For every hero's name that's known, a thousand died as well. On stakes and wire their bodies hung, rocked in the ocean swell; And many a mother wept that day for the sons they loved so well, Men who cracked a joke and cadged a smoke as they stormed the gates of hell.

As the years pass by, I can still recall the men I saw that day Who died upon that blood-soaked sand where now sweet children play; And those of you who were unborn, who've lived in liberty, Remember those who made it so on the shores of Normandy.

It's a solemn thought that many of the 'sweet' children mentioned in the song, are playing war games on their computers, ipads and phones. They can switch them off, unlike the reality and devastation of war which Jim Radford describes in his song. Warfare has become more sophisticated over the years, but nonetheless the cost of freedom from oppression can never be taken for granted. The world has become a more dangerous place to live and I am always amazed how people can go through life without seeking to live at peace and harmony with each other. As another song says, 'Let there be peace on earth and let it begin with me'.

Scam's Awareness - B e Safe Online. Scams come in many forms - face to face, over the phone, by post and online – but online scams represent the fastest growing form of scams in recent years. We are all being encouraged to shop. bank and interact socially online but many people are uncomfortable doing so or not confident in their online security. Below are some simple tips for spotting online scams. Spot online scam s . If you think someone might be trying to scam you online, don't: give them any personal information, like bank details, computer passwords or PIN numbers, reply to their email or click on any links, download any attachments or files in emails, send them any money or buy anything, ring any numbers in emails If you've lost money because of a scam, you can report it (see below). Know the warning signs. Be careful if an offer: comes out of the blue or from someone you don't know, sounds out of the ordinary like you've won the lottery, or you've been invited to invest in an 'amazing' scheme and keep it a secret, asks you to pay for something in advance especially by bank transfer, asks you for personal information - like your bank details, computer passwords or PIN numbers, pressures you into buying something or making a decision quickly - a trustworthy company will be happy to wait, asks you to phone an expensive number - these start with 070, 084, 087, 090, 091 or 098. Spot a fake e m ail or website. Scam emails ask you for personal information like passwords or bank details to get money; called 'phishing'. They often look real – as if from a bank or building society - but remember that your bank will never ask you to confirm personal details by clicking on an email link. If you're not sure if it's a scam, check: the email or website address - if it's a scam, it might have a strange address or come from a free email provider like Gmail, for spelling mistakes - trustworthy websites are less likely to have them, if the website starts with https:// - this means the information you send on the website is secure, but the website could still be a scam if the website has a green padlock in the website address bar - this means the information you send on the site is private. If you think you're being scammed. Don't click on anything and leave the website. You might want to keep the email as evidence in case you report the scam. If you've had an email that looks like it's from your bank, contact your bank directly using the number on your card. You can also log into your account on their website - use Google to find the real one. Further help. Call the Citizens Advice

God is working through our circumstance to perform his word in bringing you out of whatever crisis you face. The desire of God for your life is always peace and the gift of grace.



As Dr. and Mrs Lawrence tried to think of ways of bringing Joseph into the conversation, Helen skipped across the room. To Helen, Joseph was another new friend waiting to be made.

She sat down in a seat beside him, eager to chat about some news she'd just heard.

'Dad told me you used to be a teacher', she began.

'That is right', Joseph nodded 'Teaching was my job'.

'I go to school', smiled Helen.

The girl shook her head, 'I try to be, but...the thing is... I'm hopeless at sums'.

'Hopeless at sums?' Joseph reached into his pocket and pulled out a pencil. 'If you like I will help you. We could do sums now'. This was a bit like offering someone who hated vegetables a plateful of Brussel Sprouts. For a split second the girl hesitated. She flashed a quick look at her parents, who smiled encouragingly. Helen knew she could say 'no' to the sums, but it wouldn't be very friendly. 'All right, then,' she nodded. 'But don't make them hard'.

The girl needn't have worried. Doing adding and subtracting with Joseph wasn't a bit like school. He made it into a game. The time flew past, and all too soon her dad said they'd better be going.

'Goodbye Joseph. I never knew sums could be such fun', Helen said as she left. 'You're a great teacher'.

What neither the girl nor her parents knew at the time was that the real teacher that afternoon was Helen. It was only much later that they discovered how God had used her to speak to Joseph that day. 'You saw how Helen immediately accepted you. My love is like that. You don't have to earn it. Turn to me and I will accept you straight away, just as she did'. This was the message Joseph heard through Helen's chatter and smile. <u>July Recipe: Whitby Fish Pie:</u> Preheat over 180 deg *C/G*asmark 6

8oz(220 gms) strong bread flour 4oz(110 gms) cold salted butter - diced 3.1/2 tablespoons cold water 1 small egg - beaten

<u>Filling</u>

Small amount of oil
500-600gms cod fillet/loin
2 rashers bacon chopped
150ml (1/4 pint)milk
20gms(3/4oz) cornflour.

Freshly ground black pepper.

Plus 2 - 3 eggs hardboiled for 7 - 8 mins, cooled immediately in cold water, peeled and quartered.

Small handful chopped parsley.

Buttered 9inch pie dish.

Make pastry in usual way - chill

Roll out $\frac{1}{4}$ inch thick - cut out circle slightly larger that dish.

Fry bacon. Set aside. Cook fish in clean pan in a dab of oil.

Mix cornflour to smooth paste with 2 - 3 tblspn milk plus liquor from fish pan, stir constantly until thickens. Bring to boil still whisking. Lower heat, whisk till smooth and

season. Stir in cheese if you wish. Combine filling ingredients in dish. Scatter with parsley. Lay halved or quartered eggs on top pressing down slightly into mixture. Cover with sauce. Crimp edges. Brush with egg wash. Bake 30mins or until golden brown.

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Joseph of Nazareth: Lessons from a Carpenter

Everyone knows that Jesus' stepfather, Joseph was a carpenter and that Matthew calls him 'a righteous man', but we seldom think about the wisdom he handed down to Jesus. In ancient times it was customary for a son to follow his father into his trade. Joseph's trade was carpentry, and probably worked in other towns and well as the village of Nazareth. Archaeological digs at the ancient Galilean city of Zippori, only four miles away have shown extensive building was done during the years that Joseph was working as a carpenter. It is very likely that Joseph and the young Jesus made the hours walk to help in the city's reconstruction. Much later in Jesus' life when he returned to his hometown of Nazareth to teach the gospel, the people in the synagogue couldn't get past his former life, asking, 'Isn't this the carpenter?'(Mark 6:3) As a carpenter, Jesus must have learned many tricks of the woodworking trade from Joseph. While tools and techniques have changed a great deal over the past 2000 years, 3 simple rules that Joseph lived by still hold true today.

- 1) <u>Measure twice, cut once.</u> Wood was scarce in Israel, Joseph and his apprentice Jesus, couldn't afford to make mistakes, so they proceeded with caution. It's a wise principle for our lives too. Thinking ahead prevents a lot of trouble.
- 2) Use the Right Tool for the Job; Joseph wouldn't have tried to pound with a chisel or drill a hole with an axe. Every carpenter had a special tool for each task. Don't use anger when understanding is called for, or indifference when encouragement is needed. Jesus gave people hope.
- 3) Take care of your tools and They'll take care of You:
 Joseph's livelihood depended on his tools. Christian men have
 the tools given by employers, and those men have a
 responsibility to take care of them. In the body of Christ,
 every Christian man is a carpenter, you can mentor your
 apprentices sons, daughters, friends and relatives. Work for
 God with your head, and heart and hands and you can't go
 wrong.

Such contempt - and from those who should have been the first to show love and compassion! Jesus loved people; look how He dealt with the woman at the well. First, He broke the rules. Jews didn't mix with Gentiles, and they certainly didn't associate with her kind. (She had been divorced 5 times). Jesus walked for miles to meet this woman. He went into her world to bring her into His. He mixed with her not to take advantage of her or become like her, but to reach, redeem and restore her. That's why He is called 'a friend of sinners' (Matthew 11:19) Could people say that about you? Second, He broke the ice. Jesus talked about what she was interested in - water. You must start where people are, not where you think they should be. You must use words they understand. And get over your fear of rejection. You may lose face if they say no, but think what they will lose if they never have a chance to say yes to the Gospel. Third, He broke the news, He offered her living water instead of dead religion. How can you say you love someone and not share with them the greatest thing you ever found - salvation? Everybody you meet is hung up on the past, anxious about the future, or in need of a real friend. Once you find which door they're behind, walk through it with love and sensitivity. They are 'thirsty for the living water'. Share it with them.
