IN WORD Look around you. You probably see a lot of people who have it made, who seem to be getting along fine in life. Many of them have everything handed to them on a platter, while others succeed at pushing and shoving to get what they want. And people who are having a hard time...well, it's probably only temporary. Everyone goes through a hard time. But surely they know it will all work out in the end.

Illusions aside, nearly everyone you see is wounded in one way or another. Those who don't exhibit eternal crises may very well have deep insecurities or epic internal struggles with issues we don't see. Those who are struggling may wonder if life will ever get better, if God has lost sight of them or withdrawn His favour. Though hope is out there, they wonder if it applies to them. Across the board, people carry dysfunctions and hurts and grief that we rarely see.

This truth may be less pronounced in the church – a lot of healing has taken place in those who come to Jesus – but it's still there. Christians aren't immune from these issues; we have our struggles. In fact, sometimes are less openly discussed among believers than in the world because we're supposed to be healthy and whole. To bare our souls could shatter the church's image or our own. Sadly, the walking wounded often need to walk less openly in the place where redemption should occur.

IN DEED The truth is that everyone needs encouragement at a deeper level and more often than most of us imagine. Everyone we run into has a story, and each story most likely has involved some pain. One of the primary functions of the body of believers is to offer words of affirmation and healing to each of its members, our fellowships should be marked by encouragement, even to the point of sounding excessive. That's how people get strengthened. Take every opportunity, even today, to build someone up.

*Let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds.

JANUARY RECIPE: CHEESE AND CHIVE SCONE LOAF:

Makes 500gm loaf.

Ingredients:

75g chilled unsalted butter, cubed, plus extra for greasing.
375g self-raising flour, plus extra for dusting.
1tsp baking powder
100ml milk, plus extra for brushing
80ml buttermilk
100g mature cheddar – grated, plus extra for sprinkling
20g chives, snippede into small pieces, plus extra for sprinkling.
Black pepper. 500g loaf tin.

Method:

Preheat the oven to 220 deg C/Gas mark 7.

Grease and line loaf tin.

In a large bowl combine the butter into the flour until fully integrated.

Mix in the milk, buttermilk, cheese and chives, bringing it together into a dough. Season with black pepper.

Knead the dough for 1 – 2 minutes until just smooth, then place on a clean surface dusted with flour.

Make into a loaf shape, by rolling by hand to fit the prepared tin.

Transfer to the tin and, with a sharp knife, slice , slice the top of the loaf four times. Sprinkle over the extra cheese and chives.

Brush the top of the loaf with the extra milk. Bake for 25mins until golden.

Allow to cool for 30 minutes before removing from the tin, slicing and serving. Enjoy

EPIPHANY: (Sometimes called 3 kings day)

Up until the 19th century, the Epiphany was more important than Christmas Day, and it was used to celebrate both the three kings' (or three wise men's) visit to Jesus shortly after his birth and also Jesus' baptism by John the Baptist.

In the West, Christians began celebrating the Epiphany in the 4th century, associating it with the visit of the Magi (the three kings) to Bethlehem.

According to the Gospel of Matthew, the three wise men - named Melchior, Caspar and Balthazar - followed the star of Bethlehem across the desert to meet the baby Jesus, offering gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

The gifts were symbolic of the importance of Jesus' birth, the gold representing his royal standing; frankincense his divine birth; and myrrh his mortality. The three Kings (Melchior, Caspar and Balthazar) represented Europe, Arabia and Africa respectively.

Festivities for the ancient Christian feast day vary around the world, from swimming in icy waters to exchanging presents, fireworks and parades. In many countries the day is a public holiday.

As recently as the 1950s, Twelfth Night in Britain was a night for wassailing. Wassailers, like carol singers, go from house to house singing and wishing their neighbours good health.

Hundreds of years ago, roast lamb was traditionally served at Epiphany in honour of Christ and the three Kings' visit.

The Drury Lane Theatre in London has had a tradition since 1795 of providing a Twelfth Night cake. The will of Robert Baddeley made a bequest of £100 to provide cake and punch every year for the company in residence at the theatre on 6 January. The tradition still continues.

A true story as told by our friend Anne about the year of 1945

Two little girls played in the patch of bare earth alongside the pigstys. They wore shabby dungarees and felted jumpers. They were engrossed in their favourite game of mud pies occasionally tipping water into the earth to make it more pliable. They carefully patted the mud into pie shapes decorating them with stones and pieces of broken crockery. The younger child, plumper and prettier than her sister, watched the older child and copied everything she did absentmindedly, with no thought for hygiene, the bigger girl wiped her finger down her dungarees and popped it into her mouth, sucking placidly. It was May 1945, and the little girls were my sister Janet and me and I was six years old.

I remember that day as though it was yesterday. Suddenly the church bells rang out. I clutched Janet's muddy hand, dragging her towards the house. Fear gripped me – our Mother had said that when the church bells rang then the Germans would have invaded. I was not going to be invaded whatever that might mean – I wanted my Mother and the safety of our little cottage. My Mother stood in the doorway, tears running down her face, she held out her arms to us and said, 'Girls, the war is over, your Daddy will be coming home'. And indeed he did come home but in the meantime there was the serious business of the Victory parade.

The whole village gathered down the 'bottom end' for the parade. Many children wore fancy dress, Betty Cotton was John Bull and sported a black waistcoat and a top hat, but we just waved Union Jack flags. Our Mother, not being very imaginative regarding fancy dress, thought flags were sufficient, so we waved these vigorously – we were quite bemused by the excitement and overwhelmed by the mountains of food which had been prepared. As if by magic – tins of salmon, fruit and cream appeared having been stashed away for just such an occasion as this, and what an occasion. The grown ups made the most of it, dancing and singing in the street, hugging and kissing

each other and rejoicing in the fact the war had ended; but we children were too young to know what peace was, we had only ever known the

country at war. It seemed to me that 1945 would last forever. The sun shone that summer and we played happily in the fields. My Mother laughed again and set to with whitewash and distemper in 'old gold' and 'rose' to brighten the place up to welcome my Father home.

Home he came in the new year of 1947. We children were in bed when I heard the door open and my Mother's excited voice. Never wanting to miss much I ran down the stairs to greet him.

He stood against the kitchen table counting money into my mother's hand. It was gratuity money and he bought us all new coats. I do not remember having another new coat during my early childhood. He had bought dolls dressed in Austrian National costume for us all. We called them Carl, Liesl and Lotte. He also bought us a round kid handbag which had a pink silk lining.

Dad was home and life was different now. We had been on our own with our mother for two years and she had treated me like an adult. She had let me stay up late and listen to the wireless with her, we had drunk cocoa, ate toast made on the open fire and she told me her troubles. Now I had to go to bed 20 minutes after the other children, so I felt my nose had been well and truly pushed out of joint., it took me a while to accept that this was the way things were going to be. As time went by our dear father slipped back into his rightful place, and I became a child again.

Even though my childhood was spent during wartime with all its privations and fears I look down the years with nostalgia to the life that three children lived in a small village in North Warwickshire almost over 70 years ago.

‘In the case of the girls and boys you saw, it is something they must know and understand as part of their training for Confirmation, and they find it in the Prayer Book. You see, they have just started going to Confirmation classes’ ‘So, isn’t it unpleasant at all?’ said Puffin.

‘No, in fact they should find it very interesting. It’s all about being made a Christian, and what a Christian believes, and the sort of life he should live. It explains the Church’s sacraments too’.

‘I imagine my master could make all that very interesting’, said Puffin. ‘I think I’ll creep into Church when it’s going on and see if I can learn something too.’

Week 1:

Possible jobs this week: - clearing borders, raking up leaves.

Topping up bird baths.

Pruning red currant bushes, cutting back side shoots to a single bud.

Take chrysanthemum cuttings.

Week 2:

Spreading a layer of compost around your shrubs and along the base of hedges.

Dead head winter flowering pansies to prevent them going to seed.

Raking up leaves before spring flowering bulbs begin to show.

Clean the greenhouse or shed.

Week 3:

Tidying away the dead foliage from your perennials.

Turning over the soil in your vegetable plots and adding organic material such as well rotted manure.

Moving potted plants into sheltered spots.

Feeding blackcurrants.

Week 4:

Planting bare-root roses

Treating your wooden fences or sheds to a new coat of wood preserver.

Repairing damaged fences.

Making first greenhouse sowings

- 1) Listen for the sound of birds chirping as you walk about outside.
- 2) Take in the lovely smells emitting from the flower beds or bushes you pass.
- 3) Occasionally look up at the magnificent sky and watch the beautiful cloud formations.
- 4) Towards the end of the day, step outside and catch the sunset..

Try this three times a week for one month until it becomes more clear that living joyfully as possible – even in the face of difficulty. Gradually you'll be able to recover, rebuild and find more joy in the world.

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When you were young and first started speaking, did you talk to your parents in long sentences and for great lengths of time?

I doubt it, and they weren't disappointed in you; they were delighted by your first attempts to speak.

In the same way, when we truly understand that God is our loving heavenly Father and we are His children, then we won't worry so much about disappointing Him by our prayers. Don't worry about your lack of eloquence; no matter how simple they are, God delights in our prayers when they truly express the feelings and desires of our heart.

Oh that men would praise the Lord for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men! (Psalm 107:8)
