## Small Kindnesses:

Amanda works as a visiting nurse who rotates among several nursing homes – often bringing her eleven year old daughter Ruby to work. For something to do.

Ruby began asking the residents, 'If you could have any three things, what would you want?' and recording their answers in her notebook, Surprisingly, many of their wishes were for little things – sausages, chocolate pie, cheese, avocados. So Ruby set up a GoFundMe to help her provide for their simple wishes. And when she delivers the goodies, she doles out hugs. She says, 'It lifts you, it really does'.

When we show compassion and kindness like Ruby's, we reflect our God who ' is gracious and compassionate...and rich in love'.(Psalm 145:8) That' why the apostle Paul urged us, as God's people to 'clothe ourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience'(Colossians 3:12) Because God has shown great compassion to us, we naturally long to share His compassion with others. And as we do so intentionally, we 'clothe' ourselves in it.

Paul goes on to tell us,' over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity'(v14) And he reminds us that we are to 'do it all in the name of our Lord Jesus'(v17) remembering that all good things come from God. When we're kind to others, our spirits are lifted.

Jesus, thank You for showing me overflowing, unlimited kindness. Help me to find joy in doing kind acts for others.

### Praying in difficult times:

Author and theologian Russell Moore described noticing the eerie silence in the orphanage where he adopted his boys. Someone later explained that the babies had stopped crying because they learned that no-one would respond to their cries. When we face difficult times, we too can feel that no-one hears. And worst of all, we can feel that God Himself doesn't listen to our cries or see our tears. But He does! And that's why we need the language of petition and protest found especially in the book of Psalms. The psalmists petition for God's help and also protest their situation to Him. In Psalm 61, David brings his petitions and protests before his Creator, stating, 'I call to you, I call as my heart grows faint; lead me to the rock that is higher than I'(v2) David cries out to God because he knows that only He is his 'refuge' and 'strong tower'.(v3) Praying the petitions and protests of the psalms is a way of affirming God's sovereignty and appealing to His goodness and faithfulness. God cares and hears us.

#### NOVEMBER'S RECIPE: RHUBARB TANSY.

The roots of this recipe date back to medieval times. Initially, juice crushed from the leaves of the bitter herb tansy was used to flavour light, fluffy pancake type puddings known as tansies. Tansy itself, once also used for medicinal purposes, is slightly toxic, so has understandably fallen out of favour and is no longer included. This Yorkshire tansy is more like a posset or a fool than a true tansy; whatever its name, its absolutely delicious... a recipe you'll want to make again and again.

<u>Ingredients: (serves 2 – 4)</u>

1lb Rhubarb

2oz golden granulated sugar(or to taste)

2oz Butter

2 medium egg yolks

¼ pint double cream

2 tablespoons of lemon juice.

Method:

Wash and trim the rhubarb and cut into approximately 1 inch pieces.

Melt the butter in a wide pan and add rhubarb. It should fit snulgly in a single layer.

Cook gently with a lid on, checking constantly for around 8 – 10 minutes until the rhubarb is just tender.

Remove the lid and stir in the sugar until it dissolves.

Whisk egg yolks and cream together and pour over rhubarb. Stir in the lemon juice

And cook gently over a low heat, stirring constantly until thick. Don't overheat.

Pour into a serving dish, and allow to cool and thicken.

Chill one to two hours before serving.

A scattering of dried rose petals or freeze dried raspberry pieces look pretty. If you can't wait for it to cool and try some of it warm, than nits more like that ancient soothing drink recipe – a caudle! ENJOY:

### SET YOUR MIND:

He can't see any landmarks around which to fly because they are locked in a fog.But then a voice comes from the controller in the tower saying, 'Just listen to me, and I'll guide you'. Jesus said, 'I have told you these things.so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world'(John 16:33) Paul writes: 'Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus'(Philippians 4. 6 - 7) For example what should you do when the economy is bad? Recognise that neither the London Stock Exchange nor the High Street decide your security - God does. What should you do when someone criticises you? Take what's good and let no-one but God determine your worth. By keeping your mind on God's Word, you're at peace in any situation.

#### In his Hands:

William Shatner played Captain Kirk on the television series *Star Trek*, but he was unprepared for a real trip into space. He called his eleven minute sub-orbital flight, 'the most profound experience I can imagine'. He stepped out of his rocket and marvelled, 'to see the blue colour go right by you and now you are staring into blackness, that's the thing. 'You 'look down and there's the blue down there and the black up there' He added, 'The beauty of that colour and it's so thin and you're through it in an instant' Our planet is a blue dot surrounded by utter darkness. It's unsettling. Shatner's shattering flight puts life in perspective. We are small objects in this universe, yet we're loved by the One who created light and separated it from darkness. ## REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY:

Every year the country comes together for Remembrance Day, also known as Armistice Day.

A two-minute silence is held at 11am to remember the people who have died in wars around the world.

Remembrance Day marks the day **World War One** ended, at 11am on the 11th day of the 11th month, in 1918.

Remembrance *Sunday* is also marked each year, which usually falls on the second Sunday in November.

This year our Remembrance Service will be held in St. Wilfrid's Church, Old Arley at 10.15am. Wreaths are usually put on the altar. At 10.45

The wreaths will be collected and everyone will go out of Church to the Cenotaph just outside Church gates. There will be a short service and wreaths may be laid around the cenotaph. 2 minute silence will be observed at 11am.

The first two-minute silence in Britain was held on 11 November 1919, when King George V asked the public to observe a silence at 11am.

This was one year after the end of World War One, a war that had been raging in the fields of Northern Europe for four long years.

He made the request so "the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the glorious dead".

'Armistice Day' was when fighting was suspended on the Western Front in 1918, so Germany and the Allies could reach a peace agreement, and the guns fell silent at 11am.

Up to 13 million people died in that conflict which became known as the 'war to end all wars'.

Whilst this special day was first commemorated to **remember the huge losses after World War One**, today the anniversary is used to remember all the people who have died in all wars since.

This includes World War Two, the Falklands War - which in 2022 marks its 40th Anniversary - and more recent conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan.

And because this day remembers those lost in all wars, we know it more commonly now as Remembrance Day.

#### Some more true stories from Anne About Whitacre..

My sewing was never very good even though my mother thought I would get used to it. I never did finish the knickers, that my mother had paid 2/-for the material. Knitting was no better, I had to abandon my gloves because I couldn't get the fingers right and I had to be content with mittens with enormous thumbs. What I would have like to have done was what the boys did and that was garden. At the top of the churchyard was a gate leading into a long strip of earth which the boys tended.

Quite recently when I visited my mother's grave I found this little garden but it was sadly overgrown. When I was a little girl they grew all manner of vegetables. I saw corn on the cob for the first time in that garden and was fascinated by the silky hair round the cob. I couldn't imagine anyone eating something like that. To me vegetables were carrots, onions, potatoes and peas and the dreaded cabbage my mother made me eat. Each school term had its own particular flavour. In Winter we fought our way to school through the snow and ice, we often had no gloves and my Mother pushed socks on our hands to keep warm. I used to have chilblains so bad that my feet bled because I couldn't help scratching the shiny red patches and my lips cracked in the cold wind.

Once at school we all gathered round the pot-bellied coke burners and our clothes steamed with the heat. Even so we quite often sat most of the day in dampish clothes but we didn't seem to come to much harm. The winter of 1946/47 was the worst I can remember. The snowdrifts were so high on the Tamworth Road that when I walked down the track that the men made it seemed as I was walking along a ghostly white corridor because the drifts were about 6ft high. I took pride in the fact that for one week I was the only girl in school and the few boys that had made it and I sat in the smallest classroom with the stove throwing out heat and we were quite cosy.

At home, life was difficult also, the well froze over, there was a coal shortage and the wood pile was covered in ice. The icicle hung from the corrugated iron roof of the shed like clear white daggers and we had to break ice inches thick to get some water from the rain butt. Spring came and on our way to school we counted the little lambs playing in the fields. At school if any decorating was to be done then this was when the painters came. The colour scheme rarely varied from the bottom half of the wall was either green or brown, and the top cream. It was very dull but it didn't matter because we soon filled the wall up with paintings and charts. Outside the trees were in bud and green and sticky buds which we threw at each other. As in every season the teachers would take us for walks down the lanes and point out the exciting things that were happening in the hedgerows.

In those days bird nesting was not discouraged as long as we only took one egg from each nest then it was deemed to be quite ok. I never liked the business of collecting eggs because I couldn't bear to 'blow' them. A hole would be bored in each end and then the contents blown from one end and out the other, if you were lucky.

Some of the lads had boxes of eggs placed in cotton wool and neatly labelled. Butterfly collections were another thing I didn't like. It seemed so cruel to see the lovely creatures impaled on a pin. I was quite happy to keep caterpillars in a matchbox with a bit of lettuce, though, I never thought that as cruel, but it was, because the poor things died in the end.

The Summer term was the busiest one because it was then that we did our exams. Pencils at the ready and small tongues poking out the corner of mouths, we tried to remember all we had been taught throughout the year. I never found the exams hard and always came away with a prize.

I always came top and my pride would have been badly hurt if I hadn't done so. The reasons I came top was because I hadn't much competition and it was quite a jolt to my ego when I went to the county High School to find I wasn't as clever as I thought I was and there were girls very much brighter than me. I might have been a natural scholar but I certainly wasn't a natural sportswoman. It was at the end of this summer term that the sports day was held. I hated games, no-one ever chose me to be in their teams, and I suffered acute embarrassment when I was the last one to be called. One sports day I thought I'd 'really cracked it'. With another girl I practiced and practiced for the three legged race, I was confident I stood a chance of a least a third place.

Just my luck they withdrew that particular race because not enough entered. My one and only chance to shine.

It was after sports day if I remember correctly that the prizes were presented, usually by the Rector and at the very end we all gathered on the field and Mr. Patterson threw up a money bag full of ¼ pieces and we all scrabbled to the ground to pick up as much as we could.

## THE ARMISTICE:

The Armistice was the ceasefire that ended hostilities between the Allies and Germany on the 11th of November 1918. The Armistice did not end the First World War itself, but it was the agreement which stopped the fighting on the Western Front while the terms of the permanent peace were discussed. The Treaty of Versailles formally ended the War after more than half a year of negotiation.

## Why did it happen?

Germany's Spring Offensive in 1918 gained them territory but exhausted their supplies and reinforcements, and the Allies pushed them back with the immensely successful '100 Days' campaign. Four years of hardship at home and the news of military defeats led to social unrest and revolutions in Germany, and the Kaiser abdicated in November. With a weakening military and no support on the home front, the Germans had to sign on the Allies' terms.

### What were the terms?

The Armistice stipulated that the Germans evacuate occupied territory in France and Belgium. The Allies occupied the area ten kilometres east of the Rhine and declared the rest of the Rhineland region a demilitarised zone. They also insisted that the German military surrender war materiel such as planes, ships and machine guns. The Allies wanted to ensure that the Germans could not resume the war if the long-term peace negotiations broke down.

### What were the results?

The British, French and Belgians each administrated different areas of the Rhineland while the Treaty of Versailles was negotiated. The Allies also maintained their naval blockade until the final peace settlement. This meant that it was difficult for Germany to import food, making the existing food shortage worse. The German people saw this as an injustice, which contributed to negative feelings towards the Allied nations in the inter-war period.


